The sudden demise of A.PJ. Abdul Kalam is unfortunate. From his birth in a middle class Tamil Muslim family in Rameswaram to his elevation to the office of the President of India, Kalam's life has been a story of grit and determination. His contributions to the country both as a scientist and as a president are beyond comparison. He started his career as an aeronautical designer for the Defense Research and Development Organization and designed a small helicopter

for the Indian army. He was the project director of the Satellite Launch Vehicle III and played a pivotal role in the Pokhran II nuclear tests. He also took an initiative in developing India's ballistic missile system, thereby strengthening the defence system. As an institution builder, he also motivated scientists and ignited the minds of the students.

As the President, he was loved by all and earned the epithet of 'People's President'. He was elected as the eleventh President of India. His initiative to end graft through the program, 'What can I Give?', was loudable. Vision 2020, a blue-print to transform India into a developed Nation, reflected his deep concern for the country's well being.

Inspite of having scientific outlook, he was deeply spiritual in nature. His staunch belief in the existence of God is quite evident in the very first chapter of his bestselling Autobiography, 'Wings of Fire'. He was a firm believer in communal harmony and was well conversant in the holy books like The Quran and the Bhagvad Gita. He could compose poems in Tamil and could play the Veena, the classical musical instrument. He led a frugal life and worked to make the people aware of the importance of health. He also patronized the herbal garden within the premises of Raspati Bhavan.

He was born on 15th October 1931 in the island town of Rameshwaram in the Erstwhile Madras state. Jainul Abedin was his father whom Ashiya Amma, Kalam's mother, supported. So she was called an ideal help mate by people in Rameshwaram. He passed away on 27th July 2015 in Shillong, Meghalaya. The death of Missile Man is undoubtedly a great loss to Indian Nation.
